What's New in 2016-2017

Academics

- Personalized Learning: GCS is embarking on a three year plan to issue a Chromebook
 to all students in grades 3-12 for anytime, any path, any pace learning. The district
 hopes the use of Chromebooks at school and at home will equalize access to technology
 and engage students of all different learning styles. Click for a list of schools in phase

- More special education classes added to shorten bus rides: Five full time teaching positions and 10 teacher's aide positions were added this year to create five new self-contained special ed classes in closer proximity to students' homes. The move will reduce ride times by about 60 to 90 minutes. Classes were added at Monaview, Heritage and Greenbrier Elementary Schools, Northwood Middle and Wade Hampton High. (Recommended contacts are Principal Heather Hester at Heritage Elementary or Eric Williams at Wade Hampton High.)
- **Elementary Reading Interventionists:** The FY17 budget added 33 full time reading interventionist positions to provide support for students who need to substantially improve their proficiency in reading. The interventionists will support and supplement the work in the classroom to help students overcome barriers to reading on grade level.
- **Student growth:** Growth in the district is projected to be 500 students, bringing the total number of students to approximately 73,500.

Athletics

- **High School League Classification Changes:** The SC High School League has switched from a 4A system to 5A system. Six Greenville County schools (Mauldin, Hillcrest, Woodmont, Wade Hampton, JL Mann, Riverside) will become 5a. Most of our other high schools will move to a new classification. This will also affect the football playoff system.
- New Limits on Contact during Football Practice: No more than 90 minutes of "going to the ground" contact per week during practice. This falls in line with the national movement toward safety and concussion awareness. Greenville County Schools has a certified athletic trainer at all of its high schools provided by the Greenville Health System.

Career and Technical Education

• 9th Grade Exploratory Program Debuts: At two of our four career centers (Golden Strip and Donaldson) freshmen will be allowed to attend as part of a new exploratory program. We will bus them because they don't drive. These students will take eight career courses throughout the year, two each quarter, to sample the options available. We want to get them career focused sooner so they can earn work ready certifications in 10th and 11th grade and have internships/apprenticing in their senior year. Food and Nutrition Services

- Universal Free Breakfast: Beginning in 2016 Greenville County Schools will offer free breakfast to all students at 92 school locations. This is a commitment to nourish the bodies and the brains of all students. Greenville County Schools hopes the addition will remove any stigma attached with needing a free meal and allow more students to take advantage of the service. Research proves that a well fed child is better focuses and better able to learn.
- Johnny Carino Collaboration: Chef Johnny Carino of Carino's Family Italian Restaurants is a long time twitter follower of Greenville County Schools Food and Nutrition Services. This summer he contacted us and asked to create some new menu items for our school cafeterias. Carino will visit Greenville County Schools in September to debut his recipes at one of our schools. - Pay Increase for Drivers and Salary schedule Modification: Attracting and retaining drivers is a critical area of need. We are still 40 drivers short to begin the school year. The salary increase gets us closer to the pay scale of the average driver with a commercial license.
- Rules of the Road: Greenville County Schools is happy to provide bus drivers and bus safety officers to talk about the rules of the road and how distracted drivers pose a risk to children. Bus driver in-service begins August 8 at Roper Mountain Science Center. Drivers will be in the classroom and practicing hands on skills like maneuvering in a cul-de-sac.
