Recommendations for Building Strong Readers

Setting the Stage for learning

Have different reading and writing tools available, such as magazines, books, message boards, pens/pencils/marker and notebooks to show the importance of reading and writing.

Make a comfortable place and a regular time for reading.

Read to your child. When families include reading as a part of the schedule for the family, they are modeling that they value reading.

Reading with Your Child

Choose books that they can read on their own to improve their comfort with reading at a steady pace. In order to figure this out, have your child read a page or two and if they only make 1-2 errors (for pages with only a sentence or two) or less than five errors on a lengthier page, that is a 'just right' book.

Take turns reading with your child. This may include reading a page or even a sentence and then asking your child to read the same sentence/page. Children like reading the same books over and over and this builds confidence. Using silly voices for the characters makes reading fun.

Ask your child questions while reading, such as:

- Wh' questions (who, what, where, when, why...What is the penguin doing? Who is the story about?). You can begin asking questions starting with the cover, looking at the title/picture.
- What did you notice?
- Does this book remind you of anything? Have you ever felt like (name of character)?
- Does this book make you think of anything else you've read?
- What was your favorite part? Was there a part of the book that surprised you? Why?
- Any other thoughts on what you just read? What are you going to read next?
- What happened in the (beginning/end) of the story?
