# Oakview Earns "EXCELLENT" Ratings . . . Again!

As the school year opened, parents were informed of Oakview's school grade of "A" in

accordance with the U.S. Department of Education's accountability measures. As part of South Carolina's accountability measures, I am proud to announce today that Oakview has earned an EXCELLENT Absolute Rating and EXCELLENT Growth Rating on its SC School Report Card! These ratings continue our tradition of high student performance as measured by the Palmetto Assessment of State Standards (PASS). The Absolute Rating measures test score performance in the spring of 2012 and the Growth Rating measures student performance from one year to the next for those students continuously enrolled at the school.

When reviewing the data, Oakview performs near the top compared to the 642 elementary schools statewide. In English Language Arts and Math, Oakview ranks in the top 2% and 3% respectively statewide. This is attained, while at

the same time, serving an extremely diverse student population. With some of the most rigorous curriculum standards in the nation, these rankings reflect the deep commitment the Oakview community has in educating its children.

Congratulations to students, parents, teachers, volunteers, and community partners as Oakview earns yet another EXCELLENT rating on its SC School Report Card!



## Legislative Updates

#### **Greenville County School Board**

The operations of Greenville County Schools are governed by an elected 12member Board of Trustees. Each board member represents a single area of the county. There are no "at-large" seats on the board. The term of office is 4 years and there is not a limit on the number of terms a board member can serve.

The board is responsible for hiring a Superintendent and for approving school district budgets, policies and plans and conducting other official busi-Iness. The Superintendent of I Greenville County Schools reports to. and is evaluated by, the school board.

Board meetings are open to the pub-I lic, the school board generally meets I twice a month on the second and fourth Tuesdays. The meeting on the second Tuesday is informational and held during the day. Official business of the board is conducted at evening meetings on the fourth Thursday. Prior to the start of this meeting, members of the public have an opportunity to make a brief presentation to the board.

Elections for school board members

are held every two years with 6 members elected each time. Races for school board are non-partisan: Candidates are not affiliated with any political party. There is no run-off election. No matter the number of candidates for a school board area, the person with the most votes wins.

#### State Board of Education


The State Board of Education is the body responsible for public elementary and secondary education in South Carolina. The Board consists of 17 members, one appointed from each of the state's 16 judicial circuits by the legislative delegations representing the various circuits and one member appointed by the governor. Members are appointed for four-year terms.
