Miss Owens, 6th grade science teacher, took the liberty to build a greenhouse for our school. The greenhouse is a 12 by 16 foot structure and is being built by Mr. Gardener's GTT (Gateway to technology) classes. Here are my questions:

Gracie Owen: "What's the purpose of the green house?"

Ms. Owens: "The overall purpose of the greenhouse is to enhance student learning. The greenhouse will give students a new environment where they can explore standards with hands-on learning."

GO: "Why do you think it would help students?"

MO: "The greenhouse provides a new learning environment that will help keep students engaged. The greenhouse will also give students an opportunity to participate in hands-on learning labs. The hands-on labs will allow students to see the processes of plant growth as well as teach students the needs of plants. In addition to hands-on plant labs, students will be able to use the greenhouse as an example of solar energy because it has a solar-powered fan to keep the greenhouse cool!" Last but not least,

GO: "Tell me more about it."

MO: "The building is braced down with over 20 stakes to keep the greenhouse from blowing away. It is wrapped in polyethylene plastic that is UV protected and transmits 92% of light. This type of plastic was made to protect the plants inside the greenhouse. The greenhouse will have two windows for ventilation as well as a solar-powered fan that is attached to the roof. The fan will be wired to a thermostat that turns on and off automatically to keep the greenhouse around 80-85 degrees. The floor of the greenhouse will be covered with gray gravel. The gravel will help keep the greenhouse floor clean and free from mud. In addition to that, the gravel will trap heat throughout the day to keep the greenhouse warmer at night! The building was strategically placed in front of the pine trees at the back of the building so that it continually gets light from sun up to sun down. Plus the angle of the building breaks the wind gusts coming from the west of the greenhouse. Needless to say, it's built to last!"

I believe that kids these days only acknowledge the more known and seen school staff throughout the day such as teachers, administration, and counselors, because they see them more throughout the day than they do other staff (the site "A Janitor Felt Invisible to Georgetown Students" helps prove this point). Staff like lunch ladies, bus drivers, and janitors because children only see them maybe 1-3 times a day most of the time ("Teacher Appreciation Vs Staff Appreciation" by PTO Today and "Kids aren't the Only Ones Bullied" by CNN).

Children in school only see bus drivers twice in the day, taking them to and from school each day. The worst part is it's a majority of the bus driver's day every single week. According to the article, "School Bus Driver Jobs" by Job Monkey, their work schedule consists of up to 20 hours a week; that's 5 hours every day. Most children think that bus drivers pick them and a few other kids every school day and head home, but no, these bus drivers will pick kids up all the way from about 6:00 in the morning to 5:00 in the evening. They really only get like 5 hours to spend with their families. They also try to keep these kids safe, but they jump around and yell and never listen, I see this on my own bus ride to school. They do get paid a pretty decent salary of 13 dollars an hour ("Hourly Wage for School Bus Driver"), but they are still highly disobeyed and disrespected. A bus driver might drive around kids from Tanglewood Middle School, Welcome Elementary, and Thomas E. Kerns Elementary, and the kids never listen and only disobey them. As you already know, I'm a bus rider, and the worst part is I never hear any kids say "thank you" or give credit to these hardworking people who spend 5 hours of their day working and doing their jobs so these kids can go to school and back home.

But that's only bus drivers...lunch ladies are also underappreciated. I remember sitting down at breakfast eating when I heard a kid say that their food was horrible. I thought at least they make food for you, so you don't starve at school. The lunch ladies must stay at school all day making food for us, and no one ever compliments the food. They do their jobs so we can eat and live at school for the time we are there, and nobody compliments the food. Instead, they just eat it and sometimes criticize it. I do find these kids thanking the lunch ladies for their trays at the line, so at least they appreciated a little, but not enough of the time.

Lastly, the janitors are underappreciated in many ways. First, kids just throw their trash everywhere and don't pick it up. This leaves a lot of trash that the janitors have to clean, so it takes

The Endangered Animals of South Carolina Need Help

I think we should save the animals because certain animals need specific animals to stay alive. Like frogs they need insects to stay well fed. The Animals need each other to live their animals in different places now let's talk about endangered animals in South Carolina like the Carolina Gopher Frog. It is an elusive frog that spends most of its life underground. This frog has been listed by the State of South Carolina as an endangered species, but studying the frog has been a challenge because of its secretive habits. We are seeking a better understanding of the Carolina gopher frog," says SCDNR herpetologist Will Dillman. However, the frog is difficult. Sometimes animals help out other animals like the Oxpecker birds help the zebras but that's in Africa. I'm going to stop talking about animals in different places and talk about animals in South Carolina now. Another challenge for researchers is the Carolina gopher frog's declining habitat and its special needs. It depends on fire-maintained, longleaf pine-wiregrass ecosystems for most of its needs, but during breeding season, it needs seasonal, isolated wetlands without predatory fish. The frog used to be more common in the state's Coastal Plain and Sandhills. However, with the decline of longleaf pine habitats, the frog decreased also. In South Carolina, the frogs are found only on a few public properties: the Savannah River Site, the Francis Marion National Forest, and the Santee Coastal Reserve. SCDNR, as part of the Natural Heritage Program, has designated the Carolina Gopher frog as one of the agency's "highest priority" species. Besides studying the frog, researchers have tried to relocate the frog, but efforts to relocate historic breeding ponds outside of the public lands have had little success. SCDNR also is investigating where the Carolina gopher frogs used to live in our state. The Carolina gopher frog, along with the Florida gopher frog, are subspecies of the gopher frog. Gopher frogs are plump, medium-sized frogs with large heads and short legs. They are 2 to 4 inches in size. They have dark brown, irregular spots on a creamy, gray or browncolored body, with yellow-orange hidden on their thighs and groins. They resemble toads because they are covered with warts. They also have ridges along the sides of their bodies. They can live up to six or seven years, but most of their lives are spent underground, in holes left by gopher tortoises, (hence its name, gopher frog). If gopher tortoise holes are not available, they will inhabit holes made by rodents or crayfish, as well as a stump holes and root tunnels. Each frog has an individual burrow. During nighttime, each frog emerges from his or her hole to feed. The frogs sit outside their holes, on little perches or "platforms," of cleared vegetation, from which they ambush prey, such as, beetles, crickets, spiders and other invertebrates. They also will eat small frogs and toads, sometimes swallowing them whole with their large mouths. After late winter or

early spring rains, anytime between February and April, the frogs will travel up to a mile to find an isolated ephemeral pond or other wetlands site. Often the male frogs will call their mates underwater, making a vibrating, guttural sound resembling an old man snoring. After they mate, females will deposit large egg masses, of up to 2,000 eggs, underwater. Many of the eggs are eaten by aquatic insects such as caddish fly larvae and salamanders. The tadpole stage lasts from four to seven months. Tadpoles and frogs will face threats from banded water snakes, turtles, raccoons, hawks and owls. When the frogs are threatened, they will lower their head, and cover their eyes with their front feet, looking as if they are playing peek-a-boo. While the Carolina gopher frog is listed as endangered by the State of South Carolina, it is merely listed as "at risk" by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "At risk" is not an official listing. The Carolina gopher frog can also be found in North Carolina and Georgia.
